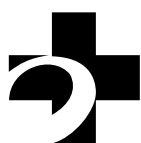

<p>Finding out the time of surgery: We will call you between 1–5 p.m. the day before your surgery.</p> <p>Coming for surgery: Come to the Surgical Day Care Unit Reception Desk on the 3rd floor, ‘D’ section. Welcome to The Ottawa Hospital. We understand that surgery is a stressful time for you and your family and we hope to give you information that will help you prepare for your surgery.

The Surgical Day Care (Overnight) Unit staff care for patients who need surgery, and are spending the night but do not have to be admitted to a ward. This booklet will give you some information about preparing for surgery, and your health-care team will give you more specific information. There is a checklist on pages 3 and 4 to remind you of the important things to do before your surgery.

It is possible that your surgery may need to be postponed because of emergencies or unexpected delays in the Operating Room. We will let you know if this happens to you.



Remember:

Call your surgeon if you are sick with a cold, flu, fever or other illness.

If you are on blood thinners (anticoagulants, antiplatelets) or aspirin, remember to tell your surgeon because these medications sometimes need to be adjusted one week before your surgery.

You must make arrangements for a responsible adult to take you home. Your surgery will be cancelled if you do not have a responsible adult to take you home even if you are taking a taxi.

If you are from out of town, the person who is driving you home may want to stay close to the hospital. They can contact Rotel for accommodations at www.rotel.ca or toll free at 1-800-267-4700.

If you need a medical certificate or insurance form completed: Contact your surgeon's office before the day of your procedure.

If pregnancy is possible it is very important to let the staff and surgeon know so we can do a pregnancy test.

Patients who smoke are more at risk of serious heart and lung problems during and after surgery. Smokers also have a higher chance of incision infections and may need to stay in hospital longer. This is why it is important that you try to quit smoking for as long as possible before your surgery. At a minimum, you must not smoke on the day of your surgery. You will not be allowed to smoke in the hospital. Many people use this as a chance to stop smoking. We have many options and supports available to help you quit smoking before your surgery.



Checklist: ✓ Evening before surgery

Take a shower or bath using regular soap and wash your hair. Do not use scented products. (If you prefer, you can shower in the morning.) It is important to be clean before your surgery.

EATING AND DRINKING INSTRUCTIONS

- **Stop eating solid food at midnight** the night before your surgery.
- Do not chew gum or suck on hard candy after midnight.
- Clear fluids make you feel well before surgery and may help speed up your recovery. Continue to drink clear fluids up to **90 minutes** (1 ½ hours) before your arrival time to the hospital on the day of surgery. Drink at least 2 cups of:
 - Water
 - Apple juice
 - White cranberry or white grape juice
 - Colourless soft drinks (sprite, ginger ale, 7-Up)
 - Colourless sport drinks (Gatorade, Powerade)
- Stop drinking **90 minutes** (1 ½ hours) before your arrival to hospital.

Also follow these instructions:


✓ The morning of Surgery: Before coming to the hospital MEDICATION INSTRUCTIONS

May take your usual medications on the morning of surgery (take with a sip of water).

Do NOT take the following medication	

Other important medication instructions:

- Bring your usual medications with you for the evening and morning after your surgery.

- Inhalers (for asthma)

- Nitro spray (for chest pain)

- Insulin (do **NOT** take the morning of surgery)

- Pills for diabetes (do **NOT** take the morning of surgery)

✓ **On the morning of surgery DO**

Take a shower or bath using regular soap and wash your hair. (If you did not do last night). Do not use scented products. You may use deodorant unless told otherwise.

Also follow these important instructions:

Brush your teeth but do not swallow.

Remove all make-up, nail polish, all body piercing and jewellery.

Wear loose, comfortable clothing.

Bring the telephone number (or cell phone number) of the adult who will take you home the next morning.

✗ **On the morning of surgery do NOT**

Do **NOT** wear perfume, lotions, aftershave, or use hair products.

Do **NOT** bring money, valuables (including phones, iPods, laptops, etc.), watches, jewellery (including wedding bands) or keys to the hospital.

Do **NOT** bring contact lenses to the hospital.

The Ottawa Hospital will not be responsible for lost or stolen articles or belongings brought to the hospital. Patients who bring any valuables do so at their own risk.

✓ **Bring the following things to the hospital**

If you have **sleep apnea** and use a machine at night, bring it to the hospital.

If your surgeon has ordered **crutches, canes, splints** or any other devices bring them with you.

You may wear your Medic Alert bracelet, dentures, glasses, hearing aids and other such aids to the hospital. Bring labeled containers for these items because you will need to remove them for surgery.

Label all your belongings and bring a bag or backpack for them.

Day of Surgery: Coming to the hospital

You must arrive on time or your surgery may be cancelled. Your arrival time is **NOT** the time of your surgery.

Day of surgery: At the hospital Surgical Day Care Unit

- Only 1 person can accompany you on the day of surgery. The responsible adult who brings you to and from the hospital must be accessible while you are here. The doctor or nurse may need to speak with them.
- Transportation arrangements for your discharge the next morning must be confirmed with the SDCU nurse prior to surgery.
- In the evening, the nurse will review the morning discharge plan with the person who is coming to pick you up, either in person or over the phone. This person must be present at the Surgical Day Care Unit between 6 and 6:30 a.m.
- Cell phones are **only** allowed in public areas of the hospital (cafeteria, coffee shop or lobby areas). Please be respectful and put phones on vibrate. Cell phones are **not** allowed in patient care areas and must be turned off.
- Maps with directions to pick-up a patient from the Surgical Day Care Unit are in the middle of this booklet. Please give to the person who will be picking you up.
- In order to allow plenty of time for your preparation for surgery you may wait 2 to 3 hours after arriving at the hospital before your surgery will start. You may want to bring something to read.
- You will change into a hospital gown, put your things in a locker and we will prepare you for surgery.

Operating Room

- No visitors are allowed in the operating room (Surgical Suite) area.
- You will be brought to the operating room area by stretcher.
- You may wait in the hall a few minutes and the nurse and the anesthesiologist will come to speak with you.

After Surgery (PACU and SDCU)

- After surgery you will usually recover in the Post-Anesthetic Care Unit (PACU).
- The nurse will frequently check your pulse, blood pressure, oxygen level, breathing, site of your operation and pain control.

- You will then be brought to the Surgical Day Care Unit (SDCU) where the nurse will continue to monitor your recovery and begin your discharge planning. This is the same area where you were prepared for surgery.
- If you are having surgery at the General Campus you will then be moved to PACU to spend the night there. If your surgery is at the Civic Campus you will remain in the SDCU for the night.
- Tell your nurse if you have pain, nausea and/or vomiting, itchiness or difficulty urinating.
- Practice your deep breathing by taking a deep breath in through your nose and blow out through your mouth.
- You will be provided with an evening and morning snack if your condition allows.
- The nurse will review discharge planning with you in the morning again.
- You may or may not be seen by your surgeon prior to going home in the morning depending on his/her instructions.
- Family may visit briefly with patients after 7 p.m. and it is limited to one visitor at a time. This is always dependant on the patient condition and activity in the Surgical Day Care Unit at the time.

Going home after surgery

- For your own safety a responsible adult **must** accompany you home even if you are travelling by taxi.

An anesthetic is a drug that affects you for 24 hours after surgery. You may feel weak, dizzy or slightly nauseated.

For at least 24 hours following your anesthetic, do **NOT**:

- Drive. It is against the law.
- Do tasks requiring skill, coordination or judgment.
- Make any binding legal decisions.
- Drink alcohol, it is unsafe.
- Take any medication such as sedatives or tranquilizers unless prescribed by your physician.
- Take illegal “street” drugs.

My care at home

Follow ALL instructions given to you from your doctor and nurse.

Pain control

- Pain is personal. The amount of pain you feel may not be the same as others feel, even if you have had the same surgery.
- Your pain should be controlled enough that you can rest comfortably. The pain should not stop you from deep breathing or coughing, getting out of bed or walking.
- Take the pain medication as prescribed by your surgeon to be sure you can do these things.
- Pain medication can cause constipation. Drink plenty of water and eat foods high in fiber.
- Your prescriptions can be filled at the hospital drugstore or your local pharmacy.

Regular medications

- If you are taking any regular medication, please ask your surgeon if you should continue to take it after your surgery.

Follow-up

- If you have not been given a follow-up appointment with your surgeon before leaving the hospital, please contact your surgeon's office to schedule an appointment.
- A nurse may phone you on the next working day following your surgery to check your progress and answer any questions.
- If you have any urgent concerns please contact your surgeon's office or go to the nearest Emergency Department.

Please note that there is NO Emergency Department at the Riverside Campus. You can go to either the General Campus or Civic Campus Emergency Department.

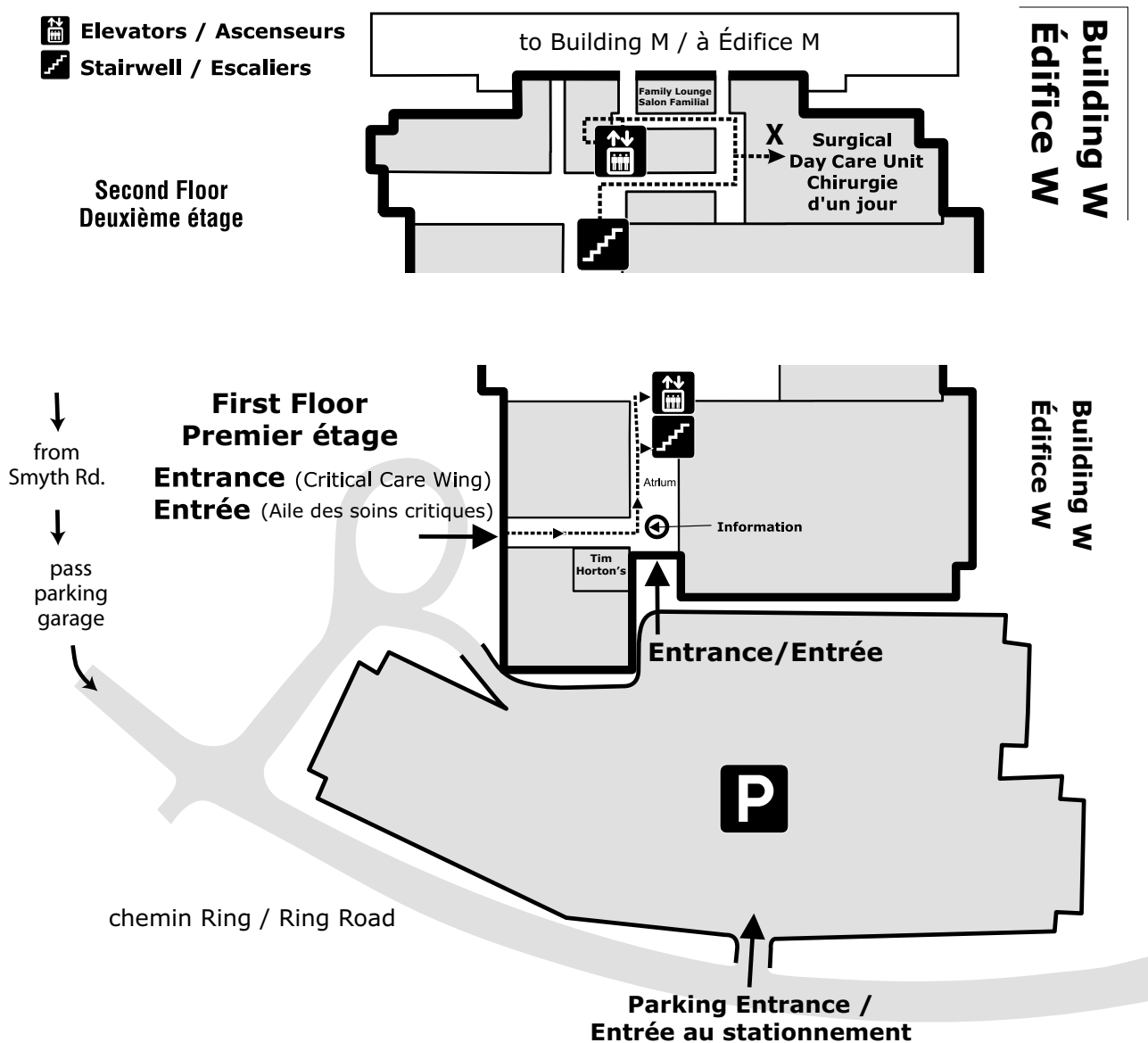

General Campus Map and Directions

When driving, enter The Ottawa Hospital complex and turn right on to Ring Road and drive past the parking garage until you reach the Critical Care Wing entrance and parking lot to your left.

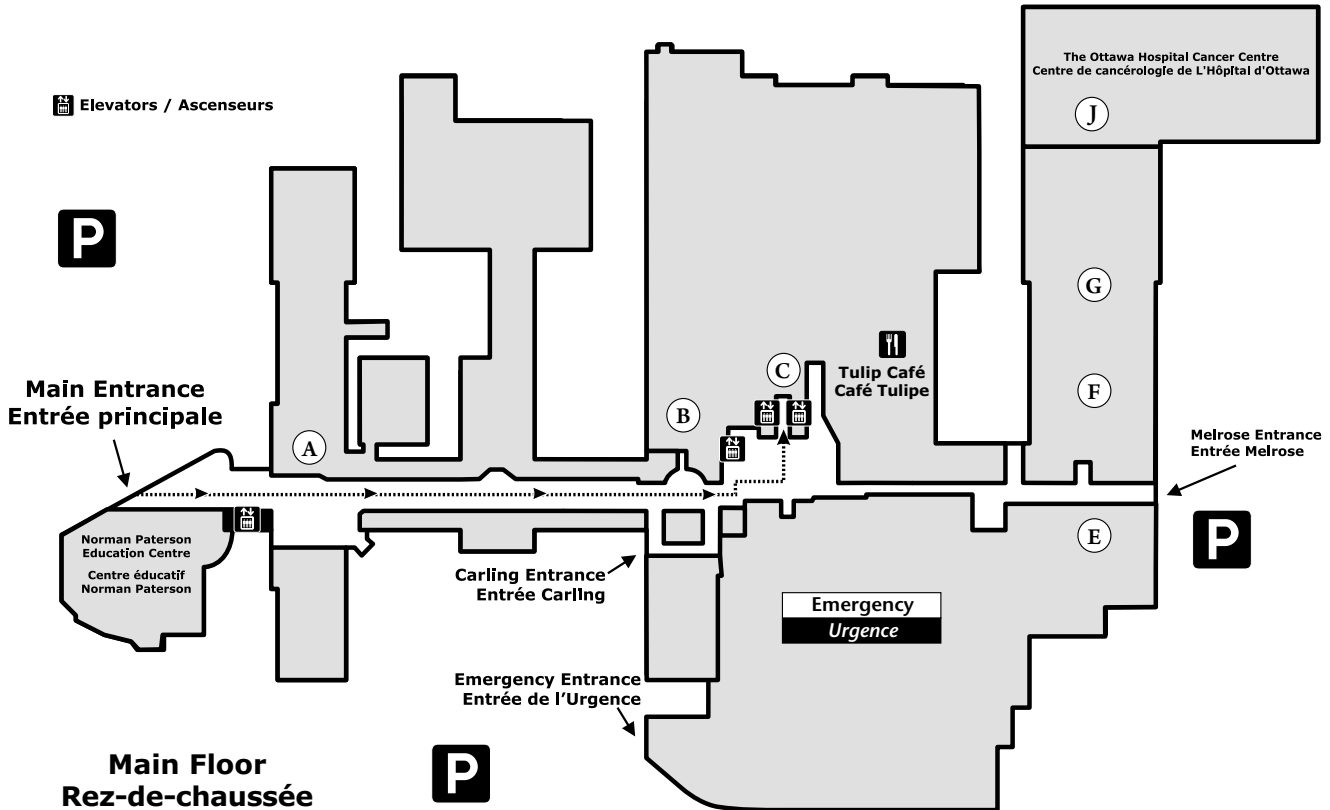
1. Enter the hospital through the Critical Care Wing entrance.
2. Proceed to the 2nd level using the stairs located in the Critical Care Wing (CCW) lobby or the elevator which is located just past the staircase.
3. Follow the signs to the Surgical Day Care Unit.
4. **To pick-up patients**, please ask the person picking you up to arrive using the Critical Care Wing entrance and go up to the Surgical Day Care Unit.

Civic Campus Map and Directions

1. To get to the Surgical Day Care Unit (SDCU), take the “C” elevators on the main floor to the SDCU on the 3rd floor.
2. **To pick-up patients**, go to the Carling Entrance as instructed by the staff and go up to the SDCU.
